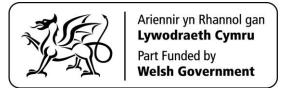

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# 1 Original Objectives

The aims of the post, as set out the Helpforce Cymru Manager job description are:

"To plan and oversee the delivery of a programme of activity which will increase the effective involvement of volunteers in health and social care in primary and secondary care settings, and to be the primary link between Helpforce activity in Wales, Helpforce UK and the Wales Steering Group.

To develop the evidence base around volunteering practice in health and social care for use by planners and decision makers and to contribute positive stories of impact to the changing narrative around health and social care in Wales."

# 2 Progress against the workplan 2020-21

This report follows on from (and aims not to duplicate) the end of year 2 report dated April 2021.

Further detail of activity in this year on a quarterly basis is given in Appendix 1.

#### 2.1 DEVELOPING PRACTICE AND INNOVATION

#### End of life care pilot projects

2.1.1 The UK wide, volunteering and end of life care Helpforce/Marie Curie programme formally ended in July. We have worked with the 3 Wales pilot projects to capture the data and learning in the best possible way and in a shareable format.

- 2.1.4 All three Wales projects aim to adapt their pilot to continue on a sustainable basis, according to the local vision, need, related services and capacity.
- 2.1.5 ABUHB continue to recruit and train end of life care companion (EoLC) volunteers, as part of a suite of befriending roles available; 45 volunteers have been trained and 19 of these are currently active. Face to face meeting with patients takes place, in non Covid wards and with PPE (mask, apron, gloves). The service is available across the entire Health Board but referrals are still slow. EoLC Volunteers are on the wards as general befrienders and proactively seek end of life referrals. The EoL training for volunteers is now being made available also to staff.
- 2.1.6 PTHB is focussing on developing a more generic Healthcare Support Volunteer role, which will incorporate best practice and feedback from the End of Life care pilot.
- 2.1.7 An end of life volunteer companion project is now being set up on a pilot basis at Ty Olwen, Swansea Bay UHB, with recruitment due to begin by the end of March 2022.
- 2.1.8 Helpforce Cymru is on the strategic core group of <u>Compassionate</u> <u>Cymru</u> which is working to improved the way in which people care, die and grieve.

# Friend in Need (Age Cymru)

- 2.1.9 The Wales wide telephone friendship service <u>'Friend in Need'</u> began as a national response to need during Covid 19. Volunteers are continually being recruited and trained to meet the ongoing demands for the service, with 164 volunteers now supporting 221 older people each month. Volunteers have been offered bereavement awareness sessions (in partnership with Marie Curie) to extend their skills and experience.
- 2.1.10 Helpforce Cymru joined a WG grant panel to award funding to local authorities for projects that complement the Friend in Need service. A case study was written on one grant recipient: Reconnect —

<u>reaching out to keep in touch in Merthyr</u>. We subsequently took part in a grant panel awarding grants from the <u>loneliness and social isolation</u> <u>fund 2021-2024</u> to local authorities and CVCs, working in partnership.

#### **Volunteering in Care Homes**

- 2.1.11 In response to an approach from the Deputy Care Inspector during Covid 19, we supported Age Cymru to pilot a model of volunteering within care homes and develop guidance to enable this to happen more widely across Wales. The focus was on enabling families to maintain contact with residents either in person or digitally.
- 2.1.12 A further pilot project on volunteering in care homes was carried out by FLVC with funding initially from the Welsh Government Coronavirus recovery grant for volunteering. We have enabled mutual conversation and learning between the two projects and facilitated events during Gofod 3 (June 2021) and in January 2022, allowing both projects to engage with wider stakeholders.

#### 2.2 LEARNING AND SHARING

- 2.2.1 A paper the Spectrum of Volunteering, was produced with and published by Eden Project Communities, highlighting the value of informal and formal volunteers in community wellbeing support. Helpforce Cymru developed and published an accompanying discussion sheet to encourage thinking about risk and proportionate risk management.
- 2.2.2 Two sessions were held at <u>Gofod 3</u>. One on volunteering and care homes, referred to above (see 2.1.10). The other was the launch of the <u>Volunteering Framework for Health and Social Care</u> (see 2.5) which included <u>video input</u> from Eluned Morgan, Minister for Health and Social Services.

- 2.2.3 Helpforce Cymru and Compassionate Cymru put on a joint online event for Dying Matters Week, including input from the three Wales end of life care and volunteering pilots (see 2.1.1).
- 2.2.4 A celebratory Helpforce event in January, with representatives from four nations and from National Lottery Community Fund marked the changed relationship between Helpforce and devolved nations. A <u>powerpoint presentation</u> summarises the key activity and achievements over 2 years in Wales.
- 2.2.5 Two volunteering conferences in March: the first 'Volunteering during the pandemic, getting the full picture' focussed on research and sought to identify policy implications to inform the work of the new Volunteering Cross Sectoral Leadership Group.
- 2.2.6 The second 'Volunteering beyond the pandemic collaborative approaches' drew on the experiences of a number of grant funded projects which have demonstrated collaborative developments in volunteering. Workshops focussed on four themes which were identified in the <u>Volunteering Framework</u> project (see 2.5.1) as being strategically important. These were: shared volunteer recruitment processes, shared volunteer learning provision, mobilising volunteers for emergencies and integrating volunteering into service design.

A report on the two conferences and professional visual notes will be produced.

#### 2.3 DEVELOPING VOLUNTEERING PATHWAYS

#### Standards and learning resources for volunteers in health and care

2.3.1 Development and publication of an information sheet on the TSSW Knowledge hub: <u>Volunteering in health and social care: standards and learning resources</u>.

#### **Volunteer to Career project**

- 2.3.2 A pilot project proposal was developed with Helpforce and Bevan Commission and launched in August, adapted from the programme underway in England. It aims to support NHS clinical leaders to develop purposeful volunteering roles and at the same time work with colleagues in the wider organisation, creating pathways for volunteers to explore career interests in health and social care.
- 2.3.3 An introductory session was held in September and conversations held with interested parties. One project, with Aneurin Bevan UHB, has been approved and is due to begin in April, supported by funding from Burdett Nursing Trust. Meanwhile initial meetings have been held with Helpforce and a baseline self assessment is being completed by the HB.

#### 2.4 BUILDING AN EVIDENCE BASE

- 2.4.1 Evaluation of end of life care pilot projects See 2.1.1
- 2.4.2 Helpforce Cymru has become a research partner for the <u>Actif volunteer 'buddy' scheme to support older adults</u>; (Active Connected Engaged) undertaken by a collaboration of research partners including Cardiff Met University. It is a 3 year, randomised controlled study on 3 sites (Stoke on Trent, Manchester, Cardiff) to explore 'how does a volunteer-led ageing programme work and is it value for money?'
- 2.4.3 Helpforce UK, Helpforce Cymru and FLVC are in conversation about resourcing a 12 month evaluation of the impact of volunteering in care homes, based on the FLVC project (see 2.1.7) which continues to grow, drawing also on wider experience and evidence from projects to date and with a view to Wales wide dissemination of successful practice.

#### 2.5 INFLUENCING STRATEGIC PLANNING

Developing a framework for volunteering in health and social care

- 2.5.1 An <u>interactive Framework</u> has been developed and published on WCVA and also on project partners' websites (Bevan Commission, Social Care Wales).
- 2.5.2 A report was submitted to Welsh Government outlining some recommendations arising from the project which are beyond the gift of any single organisation to deliver; they require a national and concerted approach.
- 2.5.3 Researchers from the <u>MoVE project</u> are working with Welsh Government to capture learning from grant funded coronavirus recovery grant projects and produced a case study of this project, based on a series of focus groups
- 2.5.2 Published outcomes of this project:

#### **Consultations**

2.5.3 A <u>response</u> has been submitted to the SCW/HEIW <u>consultation on</u> the Mental Health workforce plan for health and social care. To this end, a case study has been prepared to illustrate the role of volunteers within the wider workforce: <u>Volunteers' vital role within integrated local mental health services</u>.

#### 3 BUDGET

A summary of the project budget and expenditure for the 12 month period is shown in Appendix B.

#### Income

3.3 The annual budget of £76,265 for 2021/22 comprises 62.5K from Welsh Government, carried forward with permission from 2020/21, and £13,765 carried forward with permission from the 2020/21 Helpforce grant.

#### **Expenditure**

3.4 Expenditure includes £3630 consultancy fees relating to the publication of the Framework for volunteering, (additional to the WG grant which covered activity up to March 2021) and £900 design costs for the information sheet on 'Standards and learning resources'. Visual notes have been commissioned for the four workshops held at our event on March 10<sup>th</sup>, at a cost of £2,200 +VAT. Subscription to Voluntary Sector Studies Network cost £210.

#### 4 GOVERNANCE

4.1 Helpforce Cymru met in April, October and January and catchup conversations are held in between meetings with the co-chairs. Revised terms of reference were agreed in April, reflecting the changed relationship with Helpforce UK and the membership was widened.
